# **CALL TO ORDER**

Supervisor Lemcke called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. and led those present in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag, followed by a moment of silence. Supervisor Lemcke noted emergency exit procedures. It was noted that the meeting is being digitally recorded.

# <u>PUBLIC HEARING</u> NORTH AVENUE SANITARY SEWER DISTRICT #1

Supervisor Lemcke opened the public hearing for the creation of the North Avenue Sanitary Sewer District #1 at 6:31 p.m. The following legal notice was read and it was noted that it was published and posted as prescribed by law.

Rich Maier of Maier Land Surveying reviewed the proposed sewer district. He noted that the plans had been reviewed by the Health Department, the easement at the back of the properties would be owned by the Town and the request is being made because of a failing septic system on one of the properties involved. The proposed district will connect to the sewer main off Rolling Meadow and run along the back of these properties. Work is expected to begin in mid-January.

# INFORMATIONAL MEETING AGRICULTURE AND FARMLAND PROTECTION PLAN

Supervisor Lemcke opened the information meeting by introducing Barb Johnston, the consultant from Stuart Brown Associates. Ms. Johnston presented an overview of the Agriculture and Farmland Protection Plan, the steps that took place developing this plan and the recommendations that are made in the document. A copy of the draft plan is available at the Town Hall, the Parma Library and available online for review and public comment is encouraged. At the conclusion of Ms. Johnston's presentation Supervisor Lemcke asked if anyone had questions. There were none.

# **TOWN CLERK REPORT**

## **ZONING BOARD OF APPEALS RESIGNATION – PAT BUSKEY**

Town clerk reported a letter of resignation was received this evening from Pat Buskey from the Zoning Board of Appeal effective December 31, 2008. Mr. Buskey was thanked for the time and effort he has given.

RESOLUTION NO. 301-2008 Motion by Councilman Smith, seconded by Councilman Blackburn, to accept with regrets the resignation of Pat Buskey from the Zoning Board of Appeals effective with the completion of his term on December 31, 2008.

Applications will be accepted at the Town Hall. It was noted that an ad has been placed in the Suburban News seeking residents that might be interested in any of the Town's boards. An informational sheet was discussed. It would list the dates each board/commissions meets, if there is a training requirement and provided a brief description of what each does. It will be used in conjunction with the applications.

A list of current board, commission and committee members has been provided by the Town Clerk to assist in determining who will have access through the magnetometer once the process is initiated on court nights.

# **HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT REPORT**

Supt. Speer reported the department was working on miscellaneous road work, truck repairs and is getting ready for the storm expected later in the week. He provided the Town Board with information on the proposed extension for the Monroe County Snow and Ice Agreement. The County proposal is for \$14,591 more than what Supt. Speer budgeted for but it is \$14,871 less than what should be received if the state rental rates were used in the calculations according to the contract. Supt. Speer noted that the County calculation did not include a third column for trucks and when adjusted for that the increase would be roughly 16%. The Highway Superintendents Association has expressed that they do not concur with the proposed adjustments. Supt. Speer noted the association is concerned about the deviation from the contract. It was also noted the Supervisors Association will discuss this matter at their next meeting. Supervisor Lemcke and Supt. Speer will report back on the status.

Councilman Carmestro inquired why there was 35 1/2 hours of overtime for one employee over Thanksgiving. Supt. Speer noted that it was unusual and did not expect that it would happen anymore. The hours were for road patrol over Thanksgiving and work was done on machinery. Other arrangements have since been made.

Supervisor Lemcke noted that a ridge of stone on the west side of Spencer Road has been moved by plows into yards and inquired if the remaining stone could be leveled out to prevent this from happening again. Supt. Speer will follow up. Councilman Carmestro inquired as to how much has been spent on the Spencer Road project. Supt. Speer estimated \$40,000. Councilman Carmestro thought it might be closer to \$51,000. There was discussion on drainage items purchased.

Councilman Smith asked Supt. Speer about the status of the approval process for bridge repairs. Supt. Speer noted that things keep changing with the funding but that the original plan calls for starting the conceptual/architectural process in 2009 for building of the bridges in 2010 and 2011. Councilman Smith expressed that it was important to have our plans ready to go. He felt that projects ready to go will be first for consideration should an economic stimulus package be approved.

# **BUILDING DEPARTMENT REPORT**

Mr. Barton was not in attendance therefore there was no report.

## RECREATION DEPARTMENT REPORT

Mr. Fowler reported the 2009 Winter Recreation brochure will be ready for distribution later this week and registration will begin January 5<sup>th</sup> and will feature online registration as well as the credit card payment option.

The Town has received an \$8,000 funding grant from the Monroe County Office for the Aging (MCOFA) for use by the Senior Nutrition Center. A list of reimbursable purchases was provided. Payment is expected prior to the end of December.

The Recreation Commission meeting dates have been approved by the commission and submitted for Town Board approval at the January organizational meeting. The Commission is requesting to extend Mr. Ganley's expiring term to December 31, 2012 and to recognize James Zollweg as chairperson beginning in 2009.

## FIELD LIGHTING PROJECT - APPROVAL FOR ADDITIONAL POWER SUPPLY

Mr. Fowler reported he has met with Chatfield Engineers on developing bid packets for the purchase and installation of the light systems for the Town Hall Park Field Lighting project. Communication with the State of New York Dormitory Authority, the funding source, indicates

the final contracts will be delivered by the end of the month. Upon execution of the requirements associated with these documents, the project bid process will be advertised.

Mr. Fowler informed the Town Board that the electrical engineer for Chatfield Engineers identified that the power supply brought back to the sports fields in 2004 is not sufficient to light the three sports fields associated with this project. The engineer has recommended that an additional power supply be brought in from the street. The most efficient and cost effective way to address this would be to install overhead lines until the Lions Pavilion is reached, then put underground to a transformer box in proximity of the Morton Building. Power for lighting the fields would branch off from the transformer box. A quote was provided from RG&E for \$15,375.06 and is expected to take about a week to complete. Mr. Fowler will be looking at an energy grant opportunity and will work with Chatfield Engineers with the design of the bid packets to keep the project on budget.

Councilman Blackburn wanted to know the total cost of the project and if money was in the process of being turned over to the Town. Mr. Fowler noted that the project is estimated to be \$332,000 with \$250,000 coming from the grant, \$50,000 coming from workforce account labor (Highway and Park Departments) and the remaining \$32.000 from the Town. Supervisor Lemcke indicated the money for the power supply would come from the T0204 Recreation Fees account. Councilman Blackburn indicated that he did not want any payments made until there was an actual contract received and signed. Mr. Fowler stated that we are in receipt of a letter from the Dormitory Authority stating we are the recipients of \$250,000. He also noted this funding survived the special session held this fall. Mr. Fowler has been working with the Dormitory Authority on fulfilling their most recent requests in completing the contract. He felt the goal was two-fold: to keep the project on budget by making alternate options available should the need arise and keep the project within a timeframe of off season park usage. There was clarification on where the line would rune and that there was minimal restoration for the underground portion in the RG&E amount. There was discussion on the proximity of the lights to housing, there use in the batting cage, an existing flag pole and future use opportunities.

RESOLUTION NO. 302-2008 Motion by Councilman Blackburn, seconded by Councilman Carmestro, to approve the RG&E cost for the installation of a new power supply line from Hilton Parma Corners Road to a transformer box in proximity to the Morton Building in the amount of \$15,375.06 to be paid from T0204 Recreation Fees. Release of this payment and notification to RG&E is contingent on receipt of a letter from the State of New York Dormitory Authority verifying the funding made it through the last budget cuts and is still available to the Town with the exception of the contract being in hand.

Motion carried: Aye 5 Nay 0

The first public hearing for the 2009 Community Development Block Grant Applications will be held on January 7<sup>th</sup>. The submission deadline for projects is February 13<sup>th</sup>. There was discussion on previous submissions.

Councilman Carmestro asked for clarification on the submission for payment for purchases made regarding the MCOFA in particular to the Plantation Party House. Mr. Fowler explained this is for the 25<sup>th</sup> Annual Senior Anniversary Dinner. This is expected to be a larger than usual event and is related as a program of the Senior Nutrition Program event for all seniors in the Parma community at a reasonable cost. The Town will be reimbursed from the MCOFA. There was discussion pre-paying the full amount and the cost to seniors. Councilman Carmestro felt a deposit should be paid to hold the date and the balance paid after the event. Mr. Fowler is anticipating the grant funding by the end of the month and this would be paid for with this grant funding keeping the actual cost to seniors at a reasonable price. It was determined that this would not be paid now but addressed at the last bill paying session for the year.

# **PARKS DEPARTMENT**

There was no report for the Parks Department.

#### **BICENTENNIAL DEPARTMENT**

There was no report for the Bicentennial Committee. Commemorative ornaments are available. Supervisor Lemcke noted that he attended the dinner celebration for the Historical Society. Paul Wadsworth was honored and the Historical meeting room was dedicated in his name. He encouraged all to visit the historical museum.

## **BUSINESS ITEMS**

## **SET DATE FOR ORGANIZATIONAL MEETING**

RESOLUTION NO. 303-2008 Motion by Councilman Carmestro, seconded by Councilman Blackburn, to hold the organizational meeting on January 6, 2009 at 6:30 p.m.

It was noted that the date for the last bill paying session for 2008 was established at the 2008 organizational meeting to be on Wednesday, December 31, 2008. The time will be 9:00 a.m.

#### **HEALTH CARE BENEFITS**

Supervisor Lemcke explained that we were unable to move to the HSA account. The issue being under 50 employees would offer community rating and over 50 employees requiring experienced rating. We are over 50 employees and the rate would be higher than staying with our existing plans. Previous discussion did not result in consensus for the option of direct billing the retirees which would eliminate the problem of the threshold for the number of employees. An updated 2009 Monthly Rate Summary Sheet for Health Care was provided and reflects a 17.5% increase in the Blue Choice Plans and the cost to the Town and employees where the increase is split 50% with the employees. This would make the Town's portion \$371.50 for a single policy and \$845.50 for a family policy.

RESOLUTION NO. 304-2008 Motion by Councilman Comardo, seconded by Councilman Blackburn, to approve splitting the health care premium increase 50% with participating Town employees with the new amount for the Town portion of the benefit to be \$371.50 for a single policy and \$845.50 for a family policy.

# **BUDGET TRANSFERS**

Councilman Carmestro inquired why the Highway Unemployment transfer was coming out of A Surplus. It was determined that it should come from DA Surplus. Supervisor Lemcke inquired about the \$1,308 transfer from B Surplus to Spring Clean Up. Supt. Speer responded that there were items that could not be chipped and had to be taken to Huff for disposal.

# **INFORMATIONAL ITEMS**

### **HIGHWAY REPORTS**

Supt. Speer did not provide the requested reports feeling they were redundant to information already provided to the Supervisor from the Finance Director especially since he does not receive any funds directly through his office. He felt this was an antiquated law. Supervisor Lemcke will look into that and get back to the Town Board. Councilman Smith expressed his opinion that monthly reports reflecting the status of current and future projects would be of value. He felt a running list would be beneficial and that there is value in knowing the status of where jobs are and the progress being made.

Supervisor Lemcke gave Supt. Speer a copy of the USDA Security Inspection checklist regarding the Dunbar Road Sewer District. He stated that the checklist was months behind, requested it be completed and noted that USDA has not received anything.

#### **FLOOD ZONE REQUIREMENTS**

Bob Prince provided the Town Board with a heads up that due to the expanded FEMA flood zones the Building Department has been receiving calls from residents, mortgage lending companies and insurance companies. FEMA has sent letters to residents who own property in areas affected by the changes to the flood zone maps indicating that they must now buy flood insurance. It is up to residents to prove to FEMA that they do not have a building in the flood zone even though portions of their property may be in a flood zone area. Residents are incurring costs to prove their buildings are not actually in a flood zone area. Supervisor Lemcke asked that calls be tracked.

#### **WILDER ROAD BRIDGE**

Supervisor Lemcke met with NYSDOT, the Monroe County Bridge Group and the architect involved in the bridge rehabilitation project on the Wilder Road bridge during July and August

2009. A pedestrian sidewalk crossing has been included as an alternate design and the group was soliciting the Town's interest in having a pedestrian sidewalk included as part of the project which would take place during July and August of 2009. The sidewalk would cross the north side of the bridge starting just to the east of the bridge, cross the bridge, wrap around the corner at Bennett Road and line up with the proposed Village and School sidewalk on East Avenue. There was discussion on what was being proposed, completion based on the timeframe indicated and the cost to the Town. The County estimated that the cost for them to do would be approximately \$25,000 to \$45,000. This could be reduced if the Town did the work. There was discussion on the Community Block Grant being used for this purpose and for sidewalks from Carrie Marie Lane. A final design will be available for the Town Board to review.

## FIELD USE AGREEMENTS

Supervisor Lemcke noted that the Soccer and Football clubs would meet with the Town Board after the first of the year to discuss their 2009 field agreements. A draft of the Soccer agreement was received and the Town Board would like to have a copy of the football organization's agreement as well. Councilman Carmestro noted that he had several concerns to discuss regarding the agreements.

#### **MISCELLANEOUS**

Supervisor Lemcke suggested and the Town Board agreed to lower the temperature in the Town Hall to 68 degrees in keeping with Monroe County and the School District energy conservation measures.
